Local Elections May 2nd what you need to know

The Maidstone Borough Council, Parish Council and Kent Police and Crime Commissioner Elections are scheduled for May 2nd 2024. In preparation for this date we'd like to highlight and remind you of the changes to the requirements and ways you can vote in these elections.

From May 2023, a change was introduced to make it compulsory for anyone voting, to bring acceptable photographic identification.

This can be a British passport or a driving licence, even if these items have expired, providing the photo is recognisable. Anyone without photo ID can apply for a Voter Authority Certificate free of charge via www.gov.uk.

Postal and proxy votes also have important changes. The law has changed where an individual cannot

hand in, in person, more than five postal votes plus their own. Election candidates and campaigners are also not permitted to handle postal votes other than their own or a close relative. Anyone handing in postal votes will now have to complete a form and make a declaration, however Maidstone Borough Council strongly advises those looking to vote by post do so by posting their vote in the usual way. Proxy rules detail that people can now only be a proxy (officially designated to vote on someone else's behalf) for a maximum of two people from the UK (four in total if including overseas electors). If you are not registered to vote, search "register" on www.gov.uk to get started. If you're not online you can contact the Electoral Services Team on 01622 602007.

Changes to Parish Council boundaries from 2nd May 2024

Following a review carried out by the Local Government Boundary Commission changes will be made to Maidstone Borough Council ward boundaries. The key aim for the review is to ensure that the ratio of electors to councillors in each electoral ward is equal throughout. This aim is balanced with the need to reflect local community identities and interests and provide for effective and convenient local government. The main aspect of this review affecting Sutton Valence is that we will be joining

Headcorn to form a larger ward. This means we have broken links with Langley Parish Council who will be in a ward with Leeds. Both Sutton Valence Parish Council and Headcorn Parish Council will retain their autonomy within the enlarged ward. The changes will come into force following the local elections on May 2nd 2024.

The map below shows how our neighbouring parish councils boundaries will also change following the review.

Sutton Valence PC Annual Parish Assembly May 8th



Village speed survey results explained

Kent County Council recently conducted a speed survey for key roads of the village and the Parish Council were very concerned to learn that on North Street in both directions the percentage of vehicles complying with the 30mph speed limit were just 40.1% (Northbound) and 26.2% (Southbound), based on a survey of over 90,000 vehicles. Furthermore, 18.2% (Northbound) and 23.8% (Southbound) of all traffic are exceeding the enforcement threshold of 35mph. The Northbound traffic surveyed travels in the direction of the Warmlake Crossroads, which has been the scene of numerous accidents over the years, and the Parish Council would like to see measures in place to make the roads safer for all. The Parish Council had presented suggestions

of potential solutions to Kent County Council in an attempt to improve our highways and bring speeds down, including the recommendation of speed cameras and a mini roundabout at the Warmlake Crossroads. To date we have been unable to agree a feasible solution with Kent County Council to

mitigate the excessive speeds through the main road of the village.

Initiatives such as Speed Watch rely on volunteers to help reinforce our desire for improved safety on our roads, so don't miss your opportunity to get involved and contribute to the wellbeing of your village.

SVPC Precept unchanged for another year

Your Parish Council has decided to keep the amount of the Parish Precept unchanged at the same level it has been for the last three years. We are pleased to announce that we are able to keep this Precept at the same level against a background of rising costs throughout our national economy. The Parish Precept is the annual amount of money taken from the local Council Tax to fund the operational costs of the Parish Council, which includes responsibility for street lighting, allotments, playing fields and open areas, war memorials, woodlands, children's play areas, litter clearance and community safety. Your Parish Council is constantly researching other sources of funding outside of the Precept to ease the pressure on hard pressed budgets. Proper financial management of resources is a fundamental element of our management of parish affairs.

We still have one vacancy on the Parish Council, and we would particularly like to recruit someone who has an interest in open spaces. Care home appeal dismissed by Planning Inspector

Following a hearing on 27th February 2024 and subsequent site visit, the appeal regarding plans for an 87 bed care home and 12 assisted living apartments intended for Forsham Lane has been dismissed by the Planning Inspectorate. When presenting its findings, the Inspectorate focused its decision on policies within Maidstone Borough Council's Local Plan seeking to protect the countryside appearance. The Inspector particularly noted that the rural aspect of the land and surrounding areas would be impacted by the urbanisation from this development. It would also be visible from several locations including Headcorn Road. The result being that the scale of the scheme in the planned location would be "visually jarring". Additionally, the Inspectorate found the proposed development's location would result in an unacceptable reliance on private cars for occupiers with regards to accessibility.

The Parish Council and local residents had contested these plans throughout on several points including the isolated location in relation to village access and amenities, transport links and most of all the harmful effect it would have on the character and appearance of the area. The Parish Council also questioned Cloverdown Limited's experience, knowledge and capacity to deliver the scheme as per the plans, especially with no care home operator in discussion with the developer. Cloverdown Limited had made assurances in their plans including a minibus service to be provided for staff and a room dedicated to a visiting GP, however despite these proposed benefits the Inspector determined that the significant harm of the development would not be mitigated enough by these factors.

Extension to Sutton Valence Conservation Area confirmed by MBC

Following a public consultation exercise, Maidstone Borough Council has agreed the extension of the Village Conservation area to the east of the village.

The extended area now gives extra protection to the historic Sutton Valence Castle and its environs. Any proposed future development in the area would have to take special regard of any as yet undiscovered archaeology which may remain within the castle site.

Platinum Meadow Project update

Since the trees were planted in December 2022 they have had quite a bad time with extremes of weather. The trees were planted in initially very cold weather and partly frozen ground, this was followed by heavy rain which caused the ground to become waterlogged, and then drying winds which burnt off some of the tender new growth. This was followed by a prolonged hot dry spell in the summer and early autumn which put the trees under stress due to lack of moisture. As we know we have had record levels of rainfall each month since October. The ground at present is very wet but there are signs that many of the trees have survived and hopefully will show clear signs of growth in the next few weeks.

Medway Valley Countryside Partnership (MVCP), who planted the trees and are responsible for maintenance for the first three years of the project, cut the grass and did some tidying up work in July and September 2023. They will be carrying out some more work, this will include replacing damaged/lost tree guards and doing a count to see how many trees have survived, with a view to replacing some of the lost trees during the next planting season in winter 2024/25.
